- RDHS University Application Deadline: If students require help from the Guidance Department you must submit application by December 20th, 2017.
- > University Applications Deadline is January 17th, 2018

- \$150.00 Fee (to apply to 3 Universities and/or programs + \$50 for each additional choice).
- > College Applications Deadline is February 1st, 2018 (equal consideration date)
- > \$ 95.00 Fee (to apply to 5 colleges and/or programs).
- A reminder that 40 hours of Community Involvement is a diploma requirement for graduating students. Deadline for the hours is June 1st, 2018.

# <u>Grade Ten Civics</u>

The grade ten civics classes had an exciting semester as our local Member of Parliament (for Glengarry, Prescott Russell), Francis Drouin, came in to speak to them on Oct 10th about what the job of being a MP involves and then had a question and answer session on local issues with them. The students enjoyed the presentation and had some very thoughtful questions on a variety of topics. This experience was followed two weeks later by a field trip where the students went for a tour of the Parliament Buildings (very timely as the Parliament Buildings will be closed for repairs for the next ten to 15 years for building repairs, so it may be some time before this particular trip can happen again.) Despite the rainy weather, the students had a great time! Two students from RDHS will be job shadowing Mr. Drouin for a day later this month to get a more in-depth experience of a day in the life of our politicians.

## <u>i Lead</u>

i Lead, formerly known as FNMI, is open to all students of First Nations, Inuit or Metis heritage from grades 9–12. This is a chance for them to discover more about their heritage, meet others with the same background from across the board, and to develop their leadership skills. We had our first event this year on Nov 6th, and i Lead students were invited to bring a friend to

this event. Our inspirational guest speaker was Dr. Sean Lessard, a Woodland Cree from Montreal Lake Cree Nation in Saskatchewan. He spoke to us about his life experiences and encouraged students to be not just themselves, but all they can be. He also encouraged us all to have conversations, learn alongside each other and build a greater understanding of the different paths we all walk. Students then worked on a leadership skills exercise. Our next event will be in December. Any students who are interested are asked to give their name to Ms. Cranstone to get forms for the next event. There is no cost to the participants. All events are free, busing, lunch and snacks are provided.


Link Crew & Student Council
